# Weather reports and other nonsense

It has been a summer to die for in New England. While other parts of the country have suffered from record high heat (107 in Little Rock, Arkansas this week, for one example) we've had warm days, cool nights and lots of summer rain.

Well, that's simply a weather report. It is a retelling of "what's happened" this summer in New England. One absolute truth about the weather is this: it'll happen, however it happens, with or without your effort or commitment or choices—or mine.

Weather reports are vaguely interesting. But the truth is that if you were alive, awake and outside, you already knew the "weather report."

What I want to share with you in this <u>View</u> has to do with anything but a "weather report." I want to talk about something that requires your effort, commitment and choice. What I want to talk about is "coming to church" on Sundays—every Sunday.

A half-century ago, "going to church" wasn't something people had any effort, commitment or choice about. Back then, in the 1950's, people simply went to church on Sunday. It was what people did. It was natural and habitual. It was as automatic as the weather report. People got up on Sunday morning and "went to church."

That's no longer true. Going to church isn't an automatic reaction these days. It isn't a habit most people have. There is only one other part of this huge nation where people "go to church" as seldom as they do in New England. In the Pacific northwest—Washington, Oregon and the northern most part of California—most people wake up on Sunday morning and do something else besides going to church. Going to church is still a "habit" in the South, Mid-West and South-West areas of the United States. But not here. Not here...

What I'm writing to tell you is this: you need to get up on Sunday morning and out of force of habit, get dressed and come to St. John's for the 8 a.m. or 10:15 a.m. Eucharist. And before it becomes a <u>habit</u>, it has to be the result of your effort, commitment and choice.

This <u>Outrider</u> is mailed monthly to all those folks we consider "active members" of St. John's and a few other folks. And if all of you who are reading this <u>showed up</u> on a regular, habitual basis, we'd have more than twice as many people in church every week.

Here's what I'm going to do, starting tomorrow. I'm going to write hand written invitations to come to church to three households a day—leaving out only those who already have the "habit" and are there weekly. Some of you will get your invitation before you read this. And some of you will get it after you read this. And I'm going to keep writing three invitations a day—21 a week—until I've written to everyone who we count as "active members" who aren't in church often enough.

I'm going to be more organized than I usually am and keep a list of those I sent an invitation to. And If I don't see you in a few weeks, I'm going to call you and ask you to tell me this: what would it take to get you in church each week?

You see, I really want to know why your seats are empty. And I'll do what I can to make it possible for you to be here. Not because of "my" needs, but because as your priest I am concerned with "your" needs. And one of the things you <u>need</u> is to worship regularly, giving back to God some small part of what God has given you.

The letters start tomorrow. If you haven't gotten one of those letters prior to reading this and you don't come to church regularly, then you could choose to come to church before you get my letter.

Here's a "weather report": a great number of St. John's members aren't in church on any truly regular basis.

It's my intention to do something about that or find out why I can't.

There's a pew with your name on it—come and fill it soon....

## PARISH RETREAT ALTERNATIVE

The parish retreat at Holy Cross
Monastery is scheduled for the weekend of
October 5, 6, and 7<sup>th</sup>. Hopefully many parish
members will attend. However, for those
unable to travel to West Park, New York,
there is still an opportunity to share in this
experience while remaining close to home.

Based on a retreat developed by Deacon Ron Cebik for a Massachusetts parish, Saint John's will conduct a parish wide experience that will touch and tap into the Holy Cross retreat. On Saturday, October 6<sup>th</sup>, from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., members and friends will be invited to attend a retreat in the parish house led by Deacon Ron Cebik. The same theme will be explored by those attending Holy Cross and those attending Saint John's. Brother Bede from the Monastery and Deacon Ron will coordinate their efforts to enable participants to reflect and pray together.

Those unable to participate in either event will be provided a booklet of offices and prayers to be used at home that weekend thus allowing the total community to share in the parish retreat. The theme of the retreat will be central to both Eucharists on Sunday morning. More information will be available on Sunday mornings prior to the retreat.

# ST. JOHN'S CENTER CAPE COD SEMINARS EXCEED EXPECTATIONS

This July, Saint John's Center for Spirituality and Ministry conducted two successful seminars at the Chapel of Saint James the fisherman in Wellfleet, Massachusetts. Each of the five day seminars met from 9 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. on Monday through Friday. The first, entitled Contemplative Resources, Finding Our Own Way to the Center, was led by Dr. John McDargh of Boston college, Dr. Ron Cebik of Saint John's, and Robert Werme, was held July 9-13<sup>th</sup>. Fifteen persons took part.

The second seminar focused on the art of preaching and was titled *Radical Recreation: Preaching Worked as SPIRIT-Play.* Dr. David J. Schlafer led seven preachers in a weeklong (July 15-20) in-depth look at their practice of sermon development and delivery.

This marked the second year that Saint John's Center has offered the Cape Cod Seminars on Spirituality. They are designed to provide persons with an opportunity to combine vacationing on the outer Cape with deepening their spiritual life. The Chapel of Saint James the Fisherman hosts the seminars as part of its ministry to the summer community of Cape Cod. Because of wide interest in the program, a special committee of persons from Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Massachusetts is being formed to continue this venture started by Saint John's Center.



# CONFETTI MEATLOAF

Recipe By Sarah Haines

2 Eggs1 tbsp. Cider vinegar1/3 cup dry bread crumbs

5 bacon strips, cooked and crumpled
1/3 cup grated peeled tart apple
1/3 cup each grated carrot, chopped celery,
onion, green and sweet red peppers
3 garlic cloves, minced
3 tbsp. dried parsley flakes
1 \_ tsp. Salt
1 tsp. Pepper
2 pounds ground beef

In a large bowl, combine the eggs, vinegar, bread crumbs, bacon, apples, vegetables, garlic, parsley, salt and pepper. Crumble beef over the mixture and mix well.

Pat into a greased  $9 \times 5 \times 3$  in. loaf pan. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for one hour or until meat is no longer pink or when the meat thermometer reads 160 degrees. Drain - invert into foil. Freeze - bring to church on the third Sunday of the month!
