YOU ARE INVITED TO JOIN THE EPIPHANY ADULT FORUM: POETRY AND THE DIVINE Led by Michael Spencer

The New Hampshire poet Donald Hall described poetry as the attempt "to make the unsayable said." At the end of his life, the great Greek philosopher Plato declared, "I should have been a poet." Both Hall and Plato, separated by nearly two millennia, suggest that poetry is perhaps the most appropriate language to convey nearly inexpressible truth. Poems play with and twist language. Poems are often symbolic, pointing beyond themselves to a far greater reality. Religious poems point to God.

On four consecutive Sundays we will consider the works of four poets whose craft is informed by their theological and Christian understanding. No background in poetry study is necessary and there will be no outside reading. Each of the poets we will study has contributed significantly to the growing tradition of distinctly Anglican poetry. During this season in which we celebrate Epiphany, we will spend our time reading and discussing the poetic gifts offered by each of these selected poets.

LENTEN ADULT FORUMS—"The Gospel of Mary Magdalene"

The best selling novel <u>The De Vinci Code</u> has caused many people to ask questions about Mary Magdalene and her role in Jesus' life and in the Christian faith. There is a "gospel" attributed to Mary Magdalene that opens up a rich conversation. On Sunday mornings at 9 a.m. during Lent (March 1, March 7, 14, 21 and 28) we will be examining the Gospel of Mary and engaging each other in that conversation. Copies of <u>The Gospel of Mary of Magdala</u> by Dr. Karen King, Winn Professor of Ecclesiastical History at Harvard Divinity School, will be available in the church office by February 15. This text will serve as the outline for our adult forums. A contribution of \$10 will help cover the cost of the books. If you're wondering if this forum is for you, here's an insight into the nature of Dr. King's book:

"Lost for more than fifteen hundred years, the <u>Gospel of Mary</u> is the only existing early Christian gospel written in the name of a woman. Karen L. King tells the story of the recovery of this remarkable gospel and offers a new translation. This brief narrative presents a radical interpretation of Jesus' teachings as a path to inner spiritual knowledge. It rejects his suffering and death as a path to eternal life and exposed the view that Mary Magdalene was a prostitute for what it is—a piece of theological fiction. The <u>Gospel of Mary of Magdala</u> offers a fascinating glimpse into the conflicts and controversies that shaped earliest Christianity.'

CREATIVE CHURCH SCHOOL NEWS

The Creative Church School meets each Sunday on the third floor from 9-10:00 a.m. New students are always welcome. In February we will focus on some of the Hebrew Scriptures as well as the Book of Luke.

February 1 - We will focus on Jeremiah 1:4-10. How Jeremiah had to say things that were hard for people to accept. Being the messenger can be difficult. Jeremiah was able to speak for God because he knew that God was with him and loved him. God chose Jeremiah and that made him special. Take some time to share this prayer with your child:

Adult: God is your Creator, God chose you and you are special.

Child: I am too young.

Adult: God is your Creator, God chose you and you are special.

Child: No one will listen to me.

Adult: God is your Creator, God chose you and you are special.

February 8 - Focus will be on Isaiah 6:1-8 (9-13). Isaiah had a vision of God, but even he can't describe God. All he can find are words for God's robe and the creatures that surround God. We can't ever find language for things that are holy when faced with God's awesomeness. Isaiah didn't feel good about himself, yet God still called him to be a prophet. Sometimes we too might think we're not very good, yet God loves us and God calls us to be disciples. This week we find stories of people like Nelson Mandela, Mother Teresa, and Dr. Martin Luther King, who have worked for the cause of justice and peace.

<u>February 15</u> - Focus will be on Luke 6:17-26. Jesus gives us the Beatitudes. Image the world Jesus is talking about. It's a world of generosity and love, life and compassion. Jesus gives us a challenge, what do we need to let go of or change so we can become a blessing to others?

February 22 - No church school - winter break.

February 29 - The focus will be on Luke 4:1-3. It's a little bit strange that we start the journey toward Easter with a story from before the time Jesus even starts His ministry. It reminds us that all of Jesus' life was about making choices. He was tempted with everything that would bring him status, but he chose the way that would bring healing, wholeness, and life to all. We are all challenged by life choices. How do we respond to the challenge?

CENTERING PRAYER CIRCLE



Perhaps the time is right this winter for a new prayer experience, one which is ancient but being rediscovered in our day. It is called Centering Prayer and it is simple, gentle, and nonthreatening. You won't have to "pray out loud" and there aren't any should's or ought's. Centering Prayer is rich, wonderful, and powerful.

The Centering prayer guidelines are:

- Choose a sacred prayer word as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.
- 2. Sitting comfortably with eyes closed, settle briefly and silently introduce the sacred word as the symbol of your consent to God's presence and action within us.
- 3. When you become aware of thoughts, return, ever-so-gently, to the sacred word.
- 4. At the end of the 20 minute prayer period, remain in silence with eyes closed for a couple of minutes.
- 5. We end our prayer period with Our Father.

We follow our Centering period with a time of sharing and discussion. We are currently reading and discussing the book <u>Centered Living</u> by Basil Pennington.

THE EPISCOPAL PUBLIC POLICY NETWORK



"Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?" Baptismal Covenant

How often have you passed the Community Bulletin Board as you enter the church from the parish hall? Have you noticed the large poster: *The Episcopal Public Policy Network,* inviting you to join?

What is this anyway? Presiding Bishop Browning has said, "We must proclaim the power of the Gospel to those in power." This network is a nationwide grassroots network of Episcopalians who bring social policies and positions of the Episcopal Church to the nation's lawmakers.

The Office of Government Relations in Washington, D.C., represents the social policies established by resolutions adopted by the General Convention and Executive Council on issues of justice and peace. The staff meets with government leaders and works with the media to build relationships with Members of the Congress and forms coalitions of both religious and secular interest groups to further the church's positions. Congress needs to hear from us when it considers many bills that impact the mission of the church. Many religious communities purport to speak on our behalf. However, we have a view and position of public policy that may be different and unique to our denomination.

The following are some of the issues advanced since 2000:

1. Upholding human rights and human needs.

- Worked to fund childcare and nutrition programs.
- Worked to secure passage of the Violence Against Women Act.
- Worked to expand the definition of hate crimes in legislation.
- Supported funding for UN relief and food programs.
- Promoted unlimited access to health care.

2. Promoting economic justice.

- Supported debt relief to poor countries.
- Supported creative initiatives and funding to fights AIDS.
- Supported antipoverty assistance in the Anglican Communion.

3. Support advocacy efforts to advance and secure peace in the Middle East.

- Supported congress to develop peaceful responses to global conflict.
- Pushed for legislation monitoring diamonds mined illegally in Africa which subsidize abduction and slavery of women and children.

4. Advance environmental justice.

- · Worked to protect the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.
- Raised awareness of economic standards and relationship to global warming and our dependence on oil.

What happens when you join? Membership is free. You will be sent congressional alerts and information, a brochure with list of resolutions adopted by convention, and addresses of your congressional reps. You can decide your action. You can call or write your congressional representatives, write a letter to the editor of the local paper, discuss the information with friends and educate yourself on the issues. My name is Monica Tiso and I have been a member of St. John's Parish since January 2002. In my previous life, I was identified as a Roman Catholic. PROVINCIAL CONVOCATION

Every year, the seven Episcopal Dioceses of New England, known as Province I, (the Episcopal Church USA has nine provinces) sponsors a Convocation the Saturday before Thanksgiving. It is held at the Mont Marie Conference Center in Holyoke, Massachusetts. Speakers and workshops provide a forum for the exchange of ideas in the light of the Gospel. The laity, clergy and bishops gather to explore issues of the church. This year the focus of Convocation was in response to the Province of New England's House of Bishops' Pastoral Letter on the

Environment, entitled, "Reclaiming the Sacredness of Creation. To serve Christ in all Creation." Part of this letter was read at St. John's Earth Sunday celebration last April. The letter calls on Episcopalians to protect, restore, and repair creation.

The two main speakers were John Carroll, Professor of Environmental Conservation at the University of New Hampshire who teaches Ecological Ethics and Values to graduate and undergraduate students, and Bill McKibben, visiting scholar in environmental studies at Middlebury College in Vermont.

Over the summer, Marcia Holroyd served on the Convocation Planning Team, working with clergy from Vermont and Massachusetts, designing the Friday Eucharist service. An Earth Prayer, written by a member of St. John's, was read at the offertory. The Rt. Rev. Gayle Harris of Massachusetts was the celebrant. Her sermon was a multi media presentation of "All God's Creation". Many thanks to Barbara Curry and Emily Gates who gave their time to scan the slides for a power point presentation. New technology is wonderful! Banners and kites from St. John's were shared with participants in a workshop on liturgy resources. The three fabric squares, members of Earth Ministry made two years for the Earth Household Clothesline Project, were displayed. St. John's Earth Ministry is a model for other churches! Let us continue our call to Protect, Restore, and Repair Creation.

Recipe For A Happy New Year -author unknown
