The View From Above The Close

"Walkin' the Walk...."

Tuesday in Easter Week

From the clergy office's window, I have a great view of the labyrinth we built in the Close last fall. It survived the winter and frost heave quite well and after our work day on May 15th we'll be "open for business" for labyrinth walking.

The labyrinth is more than simply a walk—it serves to allow the walker to reflect on life's journey. The original use of a labyrinth for Christians was to allow those who couldn't make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem to visit the Holy City to symbolically "journey to Jerusalem" by following the twists and turns of the labyrinth to the "center" of the walker's heart. One may and often does encounter God by visiting the Holy Land—but God is also waiting deep within us, in our secret places, patient and expectant. The Kingdom of God is within us in a powerful and profound way. What's required is a willingness to "walk the walk" and pursue the journey to our soul's depths.

During Holy Week we took another symbolic journey to Jerusalem to view again those so familiar images of the last days of Jesus' earthly life. From the schizophrenic combination of exuberance and solemnity of Palm Sunday through the devotion of Maundy Thursday and the deep reflection of Good Friday all the way to the pageantry and wonderment of the Resurrection—it is another way to "walk the walk".

I'm left with powerful memories of this year's Feast of the Resurrection. I had the sense this year in a new way of the importance of Hope in our Easter celebration. It is 'hope' above all things that allow us to "walk the walk" as Christ's Body in this sad, suffering, wartorn world. Emily Dickinson wrote this:

"Hope is the thing with feathers--That perches in the soul--And sings the tune without the words--And never stops—at all---"

It is "hope" such as that which Easter mid-wife's into life.

At the Easter Vigil, when we reaffirmed our Baptismal Vows, my heart was full to breaking with the words: "will you seek and serve Christ in all persons...?" and "will you... respect the dignity of every human being?" For the first time in the dozens and dozens of times I've heard and said those words, they suddenly spoke to the secret places of my heart. I'm included in those questions and promises. Am I willing to seek and serve Christ in myself? Am I willing to respect the dignity of myself? Most of us don't need anyone else to oppress us, to dishonor us, to disrespect us—we, most of us, do a good enough job of that ourselves.

A few weeks ago I remembered how Jesse Trotter, a professor of mine in seminary, challenged me to look on the faces of those I encountered in my life's journey and remind myself about each of them: that is the one, the very one, for whom Christ died....

On Easter Eve, in a new and unexpected way, I realized I have to say those words when I look in a mirror as well. So here's your Easter discipline: every morning when you look in the mirror, say this out loud: "that is the one, the very one, for whom Christ died..." I'll try it, if you will. That would be "walkin' the walk" in an ultimate and transforming way. That would be making the journey within to discover God has been waiting for us to show up. That would be a way of feeling the warm wings of feathered Hope perched in our souls and singing always....

May this Easter season find Hope being born within you...



- <u>May 2</u> The focus for this week's lesson will be Psalm 23. David writes about his faith in God, that God is very close to him, even during dark times. Faith isn't based on feeling, but based on the certainty that God could not and would not leave us. God's faithfulness to us is far more dependable than our emotional response.
- <u>May 9</u> The focus for this week's lesson will be Revelation 21:1-6. Imagine a world where no one cries, feels sad or suffers. This is the kind of world that God wants for us. What do you think would be different about the world? What would be different about your family? Draw a prayer together. On one half of a piece of paper draw the things about the world you think God wants. On the other half, draw things God wants to be different. Include this list in your prayers this week. We will also have Children's Chapel and decorate our Safe Haven box during coffee hour.
- May 16 Our focus for this week will be Revelation 21:10,22. Has your Easter excitement begun to fade? Sometimes it's hard to keep hope alive. It must have been difficult for the people that John was writing to. How can we add on to the vision of Easter? Light a candle during a meal your family shares. Talk about the ways that you have seen God's new world come. Bring in your Safe Haven donation.
- May 23 Our focus for this week will be Revelation 22:12-14, 16-17, 20-21. Just as Jesus' followers were getting pretty tired at this point in their lives and needed to be inspired, we can begin to lose sight of the vision of Easter. But God is with us from the beginning to the end, even in times when we're tired out. It's God who refreshes us. Make some time for fun and recreation this week.
- May 30 We will focus on Acts 2:1-21. Our stories of Pentecost remind us that sometimes God brings order out of chaos or chaos out of order! This is what the spirit of God does never letting us rest complacently, but promising to be with us in the uncertainty and mystery of this new world that Easter has given us.
